ANY QUERIES OVER YOUR CHILD'S EDUCATION


Every now and again something might pop up and you feel you need a question answered, further information or help to resolve an issue. In the first instance you should speak to the child's class teacher, then follow the chain of people below if you need to. If you jump straight to stages 3, 4 and 5, it may be that you are referred back to the most appropriate member of staff to deal with your issue. You will find the named contacts for child's class and key stage on the year group information leaflet that will be sent to you by email next week.

ATTENDANCE AND PUNCTUALITY MATTERS

Please be aware that the national attendance drive will continue next academic year. EPNs (fines) will be issued for unauthorised holidays. Holidays will only be authorised in the most exception circumstances and evidence to support your form MUST be included. The attendance team will be actively out and about during the Autumn term on home visits if an illness has not been phoned in. Illness needs to be confirmed with supporting medical evidence (dependent on attendance tat the end of last academic year) or a holiday is suspected after three days absence. If your attendance was below 94% last academic year, evidence may be requested to authorise absence.

It is important your child attends school every day. The impact on their progress and attainment if they miss school can not be underestimated. These children will struggle to make progress and meet their age related expectations at the end of each school year.

Being late does have an adverse impact on your child. It often leads to panic and anxiety because they are missing the start of their lessons, walking in when everyone is settled and working and missing that important time with class teacher at registration before the day begins. Lateness disrupts lessons and is embarrassing for the child. Punctuality will be challenged from September by school and local authority officers. Information will be sent to the Local Authority this year for 10 lates. This could result in an EPN being issued per adult per child.

Pupils should NOT be picked up before the end of the school day. We will be logging lost learning and aim to meet with parents with the local authority officer with those who repeatedly pick up early or have a pattern such as FRIDAYS. EVIDENCE of medical appointments MUST be provided.
